## Djinnang: From the Tribe Around Pearce "To Seek, To Look"





History of Djinnang Association (Qld)

Perhaps some of our newer members might be interested in the background of this association which began twenty three years ago and is still going strong. In fact our membership has increased greatly in recent years.

It all began in 1974 when seven ex 3Telu members gathered at Col (Limpy) Mallett's home at Clayfield, Brisbane for a few social beers. It was then decided that perhaps it would be a good idea to organize similar gatherings once each year for the future. With full agreement, a committee was formed and Ron Bellert was elected as Foundation President.

Bearing in mind the background of foundation members, initial membership was restricted to those communications personnel who had served at either 3Telu, Airtelu or Hong Kong units. The word *"Djinnang"* which appeared on the 3Telu Unit crest was selected as the association name and a constitution was drawn up. The main aim was that the association would operate as a non-profit organization and endeavour to foster some of the past camaraderie and many friendships which had been forged during many years service together.

The association flourished and in early years the annual function was held at various members private homes but this got out of hand as membership grew. Next move was to make use of the facilities which were made available to us at RAAF Support Unit at Kangaroo Point, Brisbane. Unfortunately the building and land occupied by that unit were sold and we moved to various commercial venues. Currently we are using function rooms at the Mansfield Tavern and the annual reunions are held on the last Saturday in May of each year.

In more recent years there has been a drive for greater membership to enjoy the annual reunions. Around 1990 after examination of the constitution it was realized that the restriction of membership to those who had served at specified units was too confining if overall membership was to be expanded. New members were needed if the association was to endure. With these points in mind it decided to offer membership to all personnel who had served in RAAF Communications. The common ground was that most of us had gone through the same Radio School or had served together at some time or other on various units. All past and present members of RAAF Communications are therefore most welcome to join the association.

There has been some discussion in recent years as to whether the name "Djinnang Association" should be changed and left for the exclusive use of ex 3Telu members in Perth. We still retain strong ties with that group and with extended membership in the local group the "Djinnang" is perhaps not so appropriate as it used to be. However, it is part of the original history of the group and the last General Meeting stood in favor of retaining that name for the present time. After all, the name is not nearly as important, apart from its historical value, as the common desire is to foster and maintain friendships which have endured for over twenty years. It is hoped that the association and its members will be around for many years to come.



# A Airforce is Born-Part 2

(Continuation from Qtc 22)





With the rapid approach of war in 1939 expansion schemes were expedited, and recruiting was increased. The first Australian-built Wirraway made its maiden flight on 27 March 1939, and plans were Under way to manufacture the Bristol Beaufort bomber in Australia, as well as D.H. Tiger Moths. In addition Lockheed Hudsons had been ordered from America, plus crews had gone to England to collect the Sunderland flying-boats.

When the fateful 3 Sept 1939 arrived, the Royal Australian Air Force came of age as a fighting service in the 1939-45 war. When the war began the RAAF had 310 Officers, 3,179 Airmen and 246 Aircrafts (only 164 operational). At the height of the war the service had expanded to 20,000 Officers, 144,000 Airmen and 18,000 Airwomen. At the outbreak of war, the RAAF was organized into 12 Squadrons. When war came Australia planned to send a force of 6 Squadrons (4 Bomber-2 Fighter) to Britian, however this was cancelled and Australia was instructed to Contributed to the Empire Air Training Scheme. The E.A.T.S. was to provide 50,000 trained aircrew every year, the RAAF alone trained 27.387 aircrew as well as providing training for a additional 10,351 pilots, navigators and air gunners. Under the scheme Australia formed 17 Squadrons in Britian/Middle East as well as providing aircrews for the RAF and RCAF, many Australian Airmen were serving in the RAF when war began, and in the Battle of Britian in 1940, 10 Australian were killed.

Men in the RAAF flew in major operation mounted by Bomber Command, they saw the flak of the Ruhr (Happy Valley), they helped knock out railway systems and marshalling yards, rip open U-Boat pens and wreck flying bomb sites. But the RAAF paid a heavy price with 3.486 killed . In the last two years of the combined bombing offensive, RAAF Squadrons alone dropped 65,000 tons Of bombs /incendiaries during 692 raids, and to this must be added the efforts of some 6,000 men Serving with the RAF units.









After the fall of France in 1940, war erupted in the Mediterranean, The first RAAF Squadron No 3 arrived with old-fashioned Gladiator, Lysander and Gauntlet aircraft, by 1942—7 RAAF Squadrons were engaged in the Mediterranean. RAAF men fought in Syria, they fought against the German/Italian onslaught at Malta, and they also Fought in support of the allied advance in North Africa, thence onto Sicily and Italy. About 65% of all Aircrews in Australia served at some time in Europe or the Mediterranean, with approximately 25% Losing their lives, in all 6,500 Officers/Airmen lost their lives between 1939-45.


After the Japanese launched their first attacks on 7 Dec 1941, the Australian Cabinet approved a plan to expand the RAAF to 72 Squadrons. Australia had 4 Squadrons operating in Malaya in 1941, Hudsons and Buffalos and they were immediately engaged in an all out battle.

The Japanese entry into the war entirely changed the character of the war for Australia, and with only 177 first line aircraft (mostly Hudsons, Catalina's and Wirraways) we were no longer merely a contributor to Britain's armed forces in distant campaigns, but a nation that was going to have to fight for its very survival on Australian territory. When Darwin and Broome were bombed in February/March, all RAAF units in Asia were withdrawn to Australia.

As part of the rapid built up to the RAAF strength, 3 Squadrons of Kittyhawks (75-76-77), 75 Squadron Formed in Townsville on the 4th March 1942, flew to Port Moresby on the 21st and engaged the Japanese at Lae Aerodrome, they flew continuous mission until they were relieved on the 4 April by the Americans, by which time only 3 Kittyhawks were serviceable.

RAAF aircraft took part in the crucial Coral Sea battle in May 1942, and in August 75-76 Kittyhawk Squadrons joined with the Australian Army to defeat the Japanese attempt to seize Milne Bay, the first enemy defeat on land in the Pacific War.

In the months that followed, Squadrons of Kittyhawks, Hudson, Wirraway, Beaufighters and Beaufort Aircraft, as well as a variety of transport planes, were engaged in the Kokoda Trail, Buna Sanananda, and Wau-Mubo operations and in the Bismarck Sea Battle, which stopped the enemy reinforcing their New Guinea positions.



In the mean time, 2 Squadrons of RAAF Spitfires, plus 1 British Squadron arrived in Darwin for the defence of the North-Western Area, by April 1943 there were also in the area 2 Squadrons of RAAF Hudson and a Beaufighter Squadron, plus 1 Americian Liberator Squadron, and a Dutch Mitchell Squadron, these aircraft had the range to strike north in offensives in New Guinea, Lae-Salamaua, Markham Valley, Bougainville, Solomon's and New Britain.

The RAAF Beauforts Squadron, attacked Rabaul and targets in New Britain, providing support for the Allied Landings. By November 1944, 1st Tactical Air Force consisted of two Fighter Wings, 1 Attack Wing, two airfield construction wings, to these were later added RAAF Spitfire and Liberator Sqn's The 1st T.A.F. had grown to 13.287 men, it was increased again in April to 18,894 men, which took part In the Borneo, Tarakan, Labuan and Balikpapan Operations, Some 20 RAAF squadrons were in action during these operations. In addition squadrons from Darwin and Western Australia were also involved. Many Australian aircrew also took park in the Burma-India campaigns, during this time

RAAF crews flew in Liberators, Blenheim and Wellington Bombers, and in Spitfire, Thunderbolt and Hurricane fighters, as well as Vultee Vengeance dive-bombers.

The Japanese launched a major offensive in March 1944, with aim of capturing Burma and marching onto New Delhi, but by June the offensive had withered away, Australians in a total of 18 RAF Sqn's took part in this crucial battle on the plains of Burma. So ended the greatest, the most heroic, and yet to thousands of bereaved Australians the most tragic Phase of the RAAF's History.

The Women's Auxiliary Australian Air Force (now WRAAF) was formed in April 1941.


The RAAF Air Training Corps was also born during the 1939-45. Airfield construction units, build airfield throughout Australia and the Pacific, Radar units were established and sent to fighting areas. The 1939-45 War also saw the coming of age of the RAAF, it saw also the coming of age in Australia of the aircraft manufacturing industry.

RAAF enlistments during the European/South East Asia wars were 189,700 men, 27,000 women. Casualties 10,562 killed, 3,192 injured .



## A Memory from the Past



Many years ago Milk and Cream travelled only a short distance from the cow to the table.

In the hundred years between 1860 and 1960, people moved away from farms and cows, and dairying changed from women's work at home into a mechanized industry. A delivery person — the milkman brought dairy products to towns, and cities. At first milkmen, and occasionally women, came in wagons with milk cans and dippers. Later, the wagons were replaced by fleets of trucks rattling with glass bottles.

Without milkmen, generations of families in cities and towns would not have had fresh milk in their coffee, or on their cereal, or pudding for dessert.

Infants would not have had cows' milk to fill their bottles.

In the same time period, dairying and the milk delivery system had to adapt to change. New processes and


government regulation made commercial milk from far away dairies safe to drink, and science and mass

advertising persuaded homemakers of milk's nutritional value. By the 1970s, social, economic, and

industrial changes caused milk delivery to shift to the self-service supermarket, and platoons of home

delivery milkmen

said goodbye,.




