The members that met for the first time were Col Mallet, Eddie Cunningham, Ric Montague, Dave Roe and Ron Bellert.


So in the year 2020 we will be holding our 45th Reunion, so put the 30th May 2020 aside and help celebrate this special Occasion.

RAAF closes AOCS

On 1 Dec 2004 the AOCS system was closed. The occasion was marked with a tour of Bringelly Receivers and Londonderry Transmitters where the CO RAAFTUS ceremonially cut the guy wires to drop the large antenna. Both establishments have now been decommissioned and you will soon be able to buy a one acre block of prime real estate on the Londonderry site.

The AOCS was commissioned in 1972 to take over from the Area Guard Network. The first operators at RAAF Sydney included Jeff Cullinane, Geoff Robinson, Ron Upham, Lyn Beilby, Bernie Mackay, George Harris, Ron Tompkins, Dave Corney and yours truly.

The system marked a quantum leap forward in communications technology for the RAAF and really earned it's spurs by providing instant voice and secure teletype communications immediately after cyclone Tracey devastated Darwin.


As usual there were the funny stories such as the RAF pilot questioning Charlie McMillan as to why he was operating RAAF Darwin and not RAF Dundee but this system was marked by the professionalism of those who operated and maintained it.

We live in times of rapid technological change and the RAAF we knew is no longer. We were told that Glenbrook has been sold and that the base is to be relocated to near Canberra in 2008. This will mark the end of an era which saw large numbers of communicators and techs stationed at Glenbrook, Marsden Park, Wallgrove, Bringelly and Londonderry.

Two things stood out to me during the closing ceremonies at Glenbrook: the large number of senior officers associated with the trade; and the lack of life on the base itself. Looking at the phone book they probably have a larger establishment than we did 30 years ago, but I don't think they have half the fun or camaraderie we enjoyed.

It was good to see the old base and more importantly a lot of old mates at the closure. Alison and I spent 12 years in Penrith and have a lot of happy memories of our time in the service there. On this occasion we stayed at the Airman's quarters and were the only people in our block. With unisex living quarters they would have been very popular in 1972. Can you imagine the "bed checks?"

Old hands among those who turned up on the day were; John Williams, Lyn Beilby, Rex Raph, Bill McCarthy, Don Brooks, John and Alison Cridland, Jeff Cullinane, Ian Greenacre, Mouse Graham, John O'Laughlan, Glen Walton and John Brell. On a sad note we received the news of Dave Corney's serious illness while there.







Who was the Telegraphist

As a young lad I was fascinated by morse and could stand and watch my uncle send and receive telegrams for hours. Later on as a postal clerk in Cloncurry I was still jealous of the magic the telegraphist had as they spoke to outstations such as Normanton when the wet took the landlines down. One of the compelling reasons to join the RAAF was to learn Morse. I wasn't smart enough to reason that if the PMG had done away with it, then the service would follow shortly.

Sitting here producing this on the latest in PC technology, it is easy to forget that less than a lifetime ago, the quickest means of message communication was morse code, and that at the end of the second world war, long distance aircraft still required the services of both a competent navigator and wireless operator to ensure they arrived safe and sound. Even though some still recall riding horses to school, most of us forget the huge technological changes during our lifetime. In the last few years, I have become aware of the contribution of members of this association to this progress. By accident, I attended a function at QUT when a presentation was made to a former radio officer for "Contribution to Information Technology". At the function his exploits in WWII in intercepting and deciphering the Japanese codes were highlighted. I had known the person concerned when I was serving but had no idea of just how distinguished his career had been. Recently a serving member sought information about the defunct communications trades and again I realised how little I knew and how interested others are in knowing what we did. I solved the latter problem by twisting the arm of one of our senior members to respond. This magazine is always looking for your stories so that we can record your achievements. The following is the reply to the question, who was the Telegraphist?

Firstly the telegraphist training phase in my time was carried out at School of Radio at Ballarat. Prior to this, training was carried out at Point Cook and later again moved to Laverton after the closure of Ballarat. A pass at the conclusion of training was the ability to send and receive by hand, morse code at a speed of no less than 22 words per minute. Never the less a move towards greater speeds was demanded.

During WWII some of the terminals used high speed morse (HSM) between distant and overseas terminals. The morse was sent and received by mechanical means and speeds in excess of 100 wpm were practical in good conditions. Reception was on recorders which were then slowed down and read at hand speed.

In busier communication centres telegraphists were assisted by signals clerks, who headed and distributed individual messages. Cypher operators also had the responsibility to encrypt and decrypt classified texts for either distribution or onforwarding for further transmission. As time went on teleprinter operators were used in conjunction with telegraphists on keyboard circuits. Multi channel radio circuits required constant attention and circuit control sections (CCS) were established and staffed by telegraphists and radio or telecommunications techs.

High Frequency Direction Finding stations were established at strategic points to maintain communications with aircraft and assist in navigation. Telegs who had been operator mechanics (WOMS) later became Telstechs, operating the HDF stations. These together with Area Guard stations and early Lincoln bombers played a huge role in obtaining knowledge of what we now know as jet streams, and pioneering international air routes after WW2. One of these HFDF stations on a remote part of the WA Coast serviced aircraft en-route Sydney/London via Colombo. When asked why they stayed at the remote station they coined the slogan "We stay because Qantas Wantus.

Other duties for Telegs were, operating point to point circuits, air ground air operations, shore ship links, area guard, weather broadcasts, aeradio (DCA) or OTC nets.

RAAF 100 year celebration. March 2021

Overview.

Back in January 1920, the Australian Flying Corps became the Australian Air Corps which, on the 31st March 1921, became the Australian Air Force. It obtained the King's consent to become the Royal Australian Air Force on the 13th August 1921.

As some people live in the area, some will come by van or mobile home, others stay with friends and some will stay in motel/hotel accommodation, individual accommodation We've commenced negotiations with the RAAF for access to Laverton or Pt Cook, (we don't have it yet) as we'd like to have the main events in (perhaps) the old ARDU or 1 AD hangars at Laverton or in one of the hangars at Pt Cook - it will all depend on what is still available in 2021.

It's still a few years away but these things take time to organise. We are going to chase sponsorship to keep our costs down - more on that later. We think we'll need to organise for at least 1,000 people so there's a bit to do. Make sure you tell your friends, we want as many people as Let us know what you think. The events we have planned you can see below but we need to know what you think. We've booked the Myer Music Bowl for the Sunday the 28th March (a pleasant Sunday afternoon) and we're negotiating with the RAAF, Army and Navy to have their bands entertain us during the day. 

In (about) 1976, the TELEGS, TELSOPS and TPRINOPS musterings were amalgamated into the COMMSOP mustering. Some TELEGS moved to the SIGSOP mustering. Most of these operators that moved to the new COMMSOP mustering retained their old mustering name until about mid 1980's where they had to all become COMMSOP's. Basic COMMSOP (**COMM**unication**S OP**erator) Courses were trained at Laverton between approximately 1976 until 1991. In 1991 The EDPOP (Electronic Data Processer Operator) and COMMSOP musterings were amalgamated into what is now known as the CISCON (Communications Information Systems CONtroller) mustering.

Basic COMMSOP Courses were trained in typing 35 WPM (Words Per Minute) initially on 3 row keyboards then moved to 4 row keyboards around 1985. The majority of operators left RADSCHOOL just scraping a pass at 35 WPM but within 12 months it was common place for operators to be jamming up messaging equipment that could not handle their speed. Messaging was the bulk of training. Q and Z codes/signals (Q Codes/signals are mainly civilian whilst Z Codes/signals are mainly military) were taught to assist with servicing corrupt, missing, responses to and more for messages and for use on radio circuits. Messaging initially was taught for use on the RAAFNET (the messaging system of the day using protocol 25) which used model 28 and some model 14 equipments. Messaging did move into using computers for training at RADSCHOOL around 1988 when DINTS (Defence INTerim System) was taught along with the servicing of messages. Radio operation using AN/PRC 28 radios that required a power source of 28V but we were supplied by the RADSCHOOL battery shop with 2 x 12V heavy duty batteries that were charged to the maximum every time and did the job fine. This part of our training provided radio operator skills sufficient to be used in the AOCS, to be qualified to work in the AOCS you did need to complete a post grad course. The initial AOCS used Collins equipment sourced from the USA. Back room operation we were taught on KW26's, KW7's for on line work (this provided the security for the messaging circuits) and for off line work we were taught on KL7's later changing to BID60's then onto RACE (Rapid Automatic Cryptographic Equipment). Out in the field we covered a plethora of other radio, backroom, messaging equipments that were not taught at RADSCHOOL but required the operator to learn on the job.

The job entailed message handling, delivery, servicing, creation: radio operation both in the field and in the AOCS: backroom operation in both online and offline requirements.

Postings for COMMSOPS were to Base Squadrons and just about all RAAF bases had a Base Squadron up until the late 80's, so COMMSOPS were sent everywhere there was a RAAF Base in Australia and Butterworth. Major changes to where they could get posted occurred when they became CISCON's. Then they could be posted into projects in at least five different overseas locations including the Sinai and Cambodia.


